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| Tonkin | Samuel N. | 1903-1970 | Born in Russia, emigrated to the United States in 1914. He and his wife formed an impressive collection of 18th-century snuff boxes sold at Sotheby's in 1958. 64 watches sold at Sotheby's in 1967, including a gold and enamel musical watch, circa 1780, in the form of a scent bottle, and a silver-gilt and enamel automaton watch, circa 1780, with moving figures in a kitchen scene. | <i>The Well-Known Collection of Important Watches, The Property of Mr. Samuel N. | Torrens | David Smyth | 1897-1967 | Irish professor of physiology, and amateur horologist. He accumulated one of the 20th century's largest private collections of horological material and was a great authority on horological tools. Parmenas T. | 1821-1911 | Five clocks described in a little booklet. 1653 Benjamin Chandlee in Nottingham England. 1720 Thomas Wagstaffe brought to Philadelphia in 1730, put in City Hall until 1800. 1720 Scottish wood-movement. 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| Usher | James Ward | 1845-1921 | Lincoln, UK, fine collection of English, French and Swiss watches, many made from precious metals and set with gemstones or contain exquisite enamels. Various forms include pocket and ring watches, a calendar clock watch and a watch set into a snuff box. Longcase clocks include examples by Lincolnshire clockmaker Robert Sutton, who made clocks with wooden movements, Thomas Tompion, Peter Garon, Hunter and Sons and many Lincolnshire makers including James Usher, John Stokeld and Thomas Scott. Also a collection of bracket and mantel clocks including Thomas Mudge, John Roger Arnold and Benjamin Vulliamy. 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| Wetherfield | David Arthur Fasham | 1845-1928 | Famous collection of 232 clocks in his South London home, included Tompion (now at Colonial Williamsburg), East, Ellicott, Quare, Markwick, Mudge, Dutton, and Windmills.. Bruton noted several originality problems typical of these clocks that often were extensively restored. The collector hoped that his clocks would remain in England, not be sold to “persistent American millionaires” but they were dispersed when he died. | Wetherfield, <i>Old English Clocks</i> , 1907. | Wheeler | Willard H. | 1863-1923 | Collection formed between 1880 and 1920, 100 watches illustrate the evolution of watchmaking including examples by Tompion, East, Graham, LeRoy, Brequet, Berthoud, Mudge, Arnold, Jaquet-Droz. 98 lots, full-page plates. He shot himself in the head in his Brooklyn home, leaving a note explaining that he thought he was losing his mind. | <i>The Willard H. | Willis | George W. | 1877-1970 | Collection of clocks, watches, and horological tools as part of the Willis Museum focused on the history of Basingstoke. Local clockmaker with watch, clock, and jewelry shop, antiquarian. Former mayor and honorary curator when his museum was established in 1931. Original building was later demolished and museum since 1984 now is in the town hall. 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| Yale | Elihu | 1649-1721 | British-American Colonial administrator, primary benefactor of Yale College via donation of books and goods to Cotton Mather who needed money for a new school building in Connecticut. Large collection of gold and silver watches and clocks with “several motions” sold at 1721 auction, reportedly 100 clocks each of a different make and design, and 300 pocket watches. | <i>Boston Gazette</i> , October 2, 1721. | Zale | Morris Bernard | 1902-1995 | Chairman of the Board of Zale Corporation, a nationwide network of 750 retail jewelry stores.
